Recording Songs and Spiritual Care For Incarcerated Folks

In this elective, we will participate in a project of offering spiritual care for people in the Jewish community who are currently incarcerated in New York City jails. We will make mp3 recordings to send to rabbinic chaplains, who will upload the audio content to tablets for folks to listen to. This project is inspired by abolitionist black leaders including Mariame Kaba and Ruth Wilson Gilmore, who teach us that abolition is about more than ending the prison industrial complex—it is also about cultivating life-affirming ways of being in relationship with one another. We will start this session by receiving framing around what kind of content is appropriate for us to share (e.g., songs, nigunim, prayers, well-wishes, words of Torah, and guided meditations). We'll spend time in chevrutah pairs or small groups, supporting each other to brainstorm what content we want to record, and then actually make recordings on-the-spot! Part of the practice is to release perfectionism and know that what we share—even if our voices crack—will be a meaningful gesture of grace for the people who listen to it. You are also invited to submit more recordings in the future, and to bring this project to your communities at home.

Making Meaningful Moments

For those who want to be better allies, this will include an introductory level of gender affirming practices. This is a judgment-free zone; while this is a foundational introduction to this topic, all levels of understanding are welcome!

Putting Protest (Songs) to The Test

What makes a great protest song? How do you find the right songs for your cause? How do you teach them and use them? What about "appropriation" — is it OK to sing songs from a culture different than your own, and what are some of the issues involved? Is it OK to 'repurpose' a song from the past, and how would you go about doing that? How might you go about writing your own songs, and how do you get others to sing them with you? We presenters don't pretend to have all the answers,

but we will share our experiences, listen to yours, and work together to understand the crucial roll music plays in the work of Tikun Olam! Instruments welcome.

Beyond the Fundamentals: Developing Artistry on The Guitar

So many of us have learned to be "functional" guitarists for group singing and worship, but we long to know more than the basics. Come learn how to make the guitar an elegant voice in communal prayer!
